# Why?



- Grab students' attention
- Energize or relax students for learning
- Draw students' imagination
- Increase understanding
- Build connection with other students and instructor  
(Berk, 2009, p. 2)
- Engage & retain students' attention and memory  
(Fleck et al, 2014; Johnson, 2013)

# What and How?

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- Content you'd otherwise present in lecture:
  - ▣ explain a principle
  - ▣ narrate historical event(s)
  - ▣ demonstrate a specific skill

# What and How?

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- Break up the pattern of a lesson (Johnson, 2013)
  - ▣ Students can engage & respond to video clip(s)
  - ▣ Reflect: agree, disagree, evaluate, etc.

# How? Some ideas

- Choose a clip (assign as homework if whole film)
- Make it clear: what content does this illustrate?
- Assign an active learning activity, such as:
  - ▣ Students respond in open discussion

  - ▣ Students write a 1-minute response to the clip
  - ▣ Think-pair-share, with or without a leading question

## **Kanopy**

- Netflix for Academia: variety of subjects, watch on any device
- Create playlists of clips (that will reside in your free account), share and embed them
- Most movies have CC, some of them have transcripts
- Citation tool (APA, MLA and Chicago)

- You can find films based on subjects, filmmakers, languages


